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THE METROPOLITAN FAMILY AND THE SURROUNDING COMMUNITY RESPOND TO KATRINA WITH A GENEROSITY OF SPIRIT AND GIVING



Metropolitan Memorial United Methodist Church has been the center for some of the Washington area's most energetic activity this past week responding to the needs of those hurt by Hurricane Katrina. A church in Baton Rouge sent out an urgent plea for help in taking care of the thousands of evacuees who are expectant or new mothers. Members of Metropolitan heard this plea and went to work. Metropolitan became the collection center for items dropped off by church members and by countless other good samaritans from around the area. On Friday and Saturday, September 9th and 10th, Metropolitan's office was a hub of activity as dozens of volunteers sorted, boxed and labeled the donated items. The packing completed, the week long drive culminated late Saturday afternoon when a large moving truck departed the Metropolitan campus loaded with supplies and headed to Baton Rouge. The prayers and love of hundreds in the area are now headed South in the form of the following:

- ◆ More than 40,000 diapers
- ◆ Approximately 20,000 pieces of infant clothing
- ◆ Approximately 5,000 pieces of maternity clothing
- ◆ Over 400 baby equipment items such as strollers, car seats, etc.
- ◆ Cases of food, formula, lotion, ointment, etc.
- ◆ Hundreds of dollars in phone cards



The University Presbyterian Church in Baton Rouge has opened their campus to new mothers and their babies as a place to stay until they can get back on their feet or at least find another place to live. A lot of church members are also taking these women and their families into their homes. We have talked to the pastor, Patty Snyder, and she is so grateful to the Metropolitan family for helping with such a profound effort.

A Letter from Bishop Schol

When one part of the body suffers, we all suffer with it. - 1 Corinthians 12:26



Dear Sisters and Brothers,

As you have witnessed already, the news is not good and there is need for a sustained long term effort to rebuild and repair the breach that God's people have suffered after Hurricane Katrina.

I have also been overwhelmed by the outpouring of compassion and gifts for those devastated by the hurricane that are already being received from United Methodists in WV, DC, and MD. I am blessed to serve with you in the Baltimore-Washington Conference.

I would also like to update you on things you may not be aware of.

1. Initial reports indicate that we may have lost 22 United Methodist church buildings and that their congregations have been dispersed. This also means that pastors and other church workers are not receiving salaries. More than three quarters of a million dollars in apportionment income will probably be lost by the conferences affected by Hurricane Katrina.

2. Gulfside Assembly, located on the Gulf Coast of Mississippi, which was built by African Americans to serve the Central Jurisdiction (the African-American jurisdiction created decades ago and now abolished within our denomination to maintain segregation) as a place of renewal and sacred space has been completely destroyed.

We grieve the loss of Gulfside and the church buildings. I would like the Baltimore-Washington Conference to be a leader in generosity in the coming days, weeks and months. There is no doubt in my mind that we have the capacity to practice extraordinary discipleship through our gifts and service that will go the second mile to help those that are suffering, pay pastor's salaries, rebuild Gulfside and rebuild churches. I invite you to make sure congregations are aware of the opportunities to serve and to share in their discipleship:

1. The Conference is receiving offerings for the Bishop's Appeal for Hurricane Katrina. Contributions through your church should be sent to the Conference office, 7178 Columbia Gateway Drive, Columbia, Md 21046 and marked, **Bishop's Appeal for Hurricane Katrina**. This special appeal will be used through our United Methodist channels such as UMCOR and our mission partners in Mississippi and Louisiana to provide relief to the people, pastors and congregations.

2. Explore how your congregation can help with health kits, school kits, and flood buckets. This information can be found on the Web at www.bwcumc.org.

3. A first response team from our conference is already on the way to Mississippi to help with the initial relief efforts. Additional teams will also go in the future. Please follow the Conference web page for updates on training and when teams will be going.

4. Assist with relocation efforts. To assist with housing, jobs and other support call, 202.727.1000.

5. I have asked Rev. Wayne DeHart to be the point person for all of the various issues related to this disaster fundraising, communication and information and relief efforts. Rev. DeHart can be reached at wdehart@bwcumc.org.

6. Regularly check the conference web site www.bwcumc.org. Over the next several days, you will find new and additional resources that you may use this Sunday and in the coming weeks.

I am grateful for you and your continued effort to serve. Together we will continue to make a difference for the ministry of Christ in our region.

Disaster Relief Response: Hurricane Katrina

•Dr. Trotter and Rev. Rector are calling a meeting for all those interested in helping our congregation develop a coordinated plan in response to the devastation of Katrina. •Our Youth will be assembling health kits on Sunday, September 18. These kits, requested by UMCOR (United Methodist Committee on Relief), provide basic necessities to those in crisis. Please bring the following items to the church on Sunday, September 18th (all items must be new): hand towels, (15" x 25" up to 17" x 27"), washcloths, bath-sized soap (3 oz. and up), toothbrushes (single brush only in original wrapper, no child size), fingernail clippers or metal nail files, tubes of toothpaste (4.5 or larger), strip sterile bandages/ band aids, and combs, large & sturdy (not pocket combs). We would also appreciate financial gifts to help cover the cost of mailing the kits.

•Metropolitan's Children's Ministries is collecting art work from our children to send to the rescue and relief workers working on the Gulf Coast. This response is similar to one four years ago when we sent our children's art work to the workers following 9/11. Katrina's devastation is widespread and the relief, rescue and support efforts can be disheartening. Talk with your child about Katrina, answer their questions, and encourage them to get involved by creating pictures for those impacted by this storm. A card with simply a heart and a "Thank you" or "I'm praying for you" can brighten someone's day! We must all recover from this tragedy, just as we had to do after 9/11. Remember, recovery is a verb - not a noun - and the best way to recover is to do something!

News of Our Members

Caroline Mesrobian Hickman invites interested people to an Exhibit Opening entitled "Celebrating A Century of Wardman Row-House Neighborhoods," Thursday, September 22 – 6:30 p.m. The exhibit will be held at the John A. Wilson Building, 1250 Pennsylvania Avenue, NW, and is sponsored by the DC Preservation League. Caroline, along with Sally Lichtenstein Berk served as curators for this exhibit, which concentrated on three row house neighborhoods that were built along major streetcar lines in the early years of the 20th century – Bloomingdale, Columbia Heights and Brightwood. These neighborhoods have undergone several demographic changes in the approximately 100 years since their construction and are now experiencing revitalization as the move to the city continues apace and urban housing is at a premium.

The curators recount the story of real-estate mogul Harry Wardman, who claimed in 1925 that he housed 10 percent of Washington's population. The critical role he played, not only in the development of the three neighborhoods but in the constituent city as a whole, is told with historic photographs, maps, and advertisements; architectural floor plans and elevations, and the faces and voices of current residents.

A complimentary reception will follow the opening. Reservations are not required. After closing at the Wilson Building on November 1, the exhibit will travel to the DC Public Library (Martin Luther King Jr. Main Library), neighborhood libraries, and community centers. 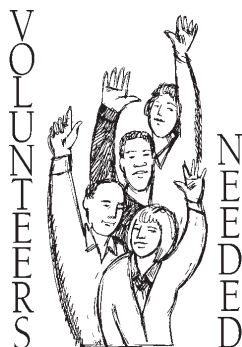
